Conway, LCSO enter agreement for full-time deputy

The City of Conway and Laclede County Sheriff's Office has made the decision to provide the Conway Community with a full-time deputy.

Conway has its problems like any other city. Even though it is a small city, it needs full-time coverage, mainly for response time. In cases of any emergency, it is nice to know that someone can be there quickly. Also, a permanent officer in the area reduces crime by just being seen in the area.

The deputy that will be stationed in Conway is Matt Frederick. Laclede County R-1 is very excited for this deputy to be present in and around the community.

"Any law enforcement presence helps provide a safe environment for our students. One thing that is beneficial with this position is he will be able to be present at the extracurricular events such as games or any events taking place at the school," stated Conway High School Principal Jaymes Wapp.

Having a deputy will improve the safety at and around the school district. Having an officer presence in and out of the school building on a more regular basis will benefit student behavior and actions. He will be able to be a presence at many activities that occur after regular school hours.

The deputy will be assigned to the areas of Phillipsburg, Morgan and Conway. The patrol area will go as far out as the Webster County line and to the Dallas County line. Roads covered will include Route J, Route C and Route PP at Morgan to Route C.







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
